Granard Primary School is 70!

To mark the occasion of Granard's 70th Anniversary a carving made from the trunk of school's iconic Cedar Tree was



unveiled on Friday 6th October. After living for around 370 years this tree was a living symbol of the school. Sadly, it died last year and had to be cut down.

The present cohort of pupils had gathered beforehand for a very special Assembly.

They were treated to an illustrated journey, beginning with a newspaper cutting of the original opening of the school in 1953 to the present day by the Head Teacher, Mrs Grigg.

Two former Heads, Mr Bridge and Mrs Cobb told entertaining stories about their memories of Granard. There was a specially composed Granard Song the pupils sang to mark the event plus a beautiful cake.

Defibrillators: We are delighted to hear that City Hall, **London Ambulance Service** (LAS) and **Transport for London** (TfL) have completed a joint rollout of defibrillators at all Underground and Overground stations, plus most bus stations and piers. For every minute that goes by without life-saving intervention like CPR and defibrillation, the chances of a person surviving cardiac arrest decrease by 10%, so it's really important we all know where defibrillators are.

Roehampton Leisure Centre. For our members in Roehampton. Did you know there's a Leisure Centre in Laverstoke Gardens, off Danebury Avenue? Apparently, a lot of residents aren't aware that it's there. Do investigate if you haven't come across it before. It has lots to offer, and the team there are keen to get involved with the local community.

If you have an oldish laptop or tablet that you no longer use, Power to Connect would love to know, so they can donate them to people without devices, but who need them. In September, we held a very popular public meeting about the River Thames with our guest speaker, Jim Trimmer, who holds a senior position at the Port of London Authority. This led to a very wide-ranging discussion covering a number of diverse topics including mud larking and swimming in the Thames to attracting more freight to the river and preparing for the Boat Race. If you were unable to attend but wish to learn more about what was discussed there is a clear audio version of the meeting available on our website.

After much deliberation of different proposals over recent years, the Council has now **agreed** to reshape the junctions connecting Putney Bridge Road and the Lower Richmond Road with Putney High Street. There is a package of measures which involve changes to the pedestrian crossing times; carriageway alterations; new traffic signals layout (and the movement of existing traffic islands) and additional measures for cyclists. For example, a new cycle 'gate'; the extension of existing cycle lanes; and the right for cyclists to be able to turn left at the junction of Putney Bridge Road and the High Street. Hopefully this will all lead to some improvements for all modes of transport. Construction work is due to begin this coming January.

And as part of these works, following a request from the Putney Society, the Council plan to pilot pedestrianisation of the Putney Embankment between Lower Richmond Road and Thames Place. The benefits of pedestrianising the Embankment tie in wider Council initiatives to improve conditions for pedestrians and open new potential opportunities for market events or alfresco dining. This will be a trial so there will be consultation with the residents and businesses in the area.



After some discussion, the Society has decided to support the proposal by **Wimbledon and Putney Commons Conservators** (WPCC) to increase the Levy.

The value of the Commons to the mental and physical health of the Putney and Roehampton residents cannot be overestimated. This is particularly true for those who lack resources for more costly recreation. We are therefore concerned that upkeep of the Commons is adequately funded.

The Society is, however, aware of the cost-of-living crisis and its adverse effects on the citizens of the Borough. The Society is also aware that all Levy payers do not benefit from the Commons to the same extent as others. We would like to see far more outreach from the Conservators to residents on the estates in Roehampton and West Putney. The two walks arranged during Roehampton Community weeks were a good start but this needs to be an ongoing process. We would like to see the Conservators working with local youth groups to allow free or subsidised use of the playing fields. And working with primary schools in Roehampton and parts of West Putney to set up regular nature discovery events as well as encouraging local secondary school pupils to become involved in volunteering projects.

Finally, we would like to see a change in the composition of the board of WPCC to reflect the fact that over 60% of their income comes from Putney and Roehampton. Currently 4 out of 5 elected Conservators come from Wimbledon. Elections for Conservators takes place next March. If you are at all interested in standing for one of the five elected posts, please do contact us and we could provide briefing and support to suitable candidates.

Meanwhile, we have met with the new CEO of WPCC, Colin Cooper, to show him the damage done to the banks of Beverley Brook when a fence was erected to block a path between Putney Common and the playing fields operated by the Barn Elms Sports Trust. Pedestrians continue to use this route despite the partial fence, sadly further damaging the banks of the river. In addition, the Sports Trust have piled up grass clippings in an effort to block this route and they are falling into the river — a possible source of pollution. It is vital that the banks are kept in good order, silting up is already taking place, reducing flow and diminishing the habitat for fish and aquatic insects. We will continue to liaise with Colin Cooper to see what amelioration is possible.

Every Panel meeting seems to include reports from the construction press about the continuing shortage of planning officers. Now the **Royal Town Planning Institute** (RTPI) report that across the country 25% of Council planners have left in the last seven years, yet the government closed Britain's only planning course a few years ago. That's why applications are still taking so long to process, despite a huge drop in development due to the economic situation. Wandsworth isn't immune. The current head of the Planning team for Wandsworth and Richmond is leaving to take up a similar post in Hampshire where she lives, leading to a big internal reshuffle.

But our Council does however still seem to have some money. Last month they granted themselves consent for a big expansion of the facilities at **Tooting Bec Lido**. Their campaign of estate infills grinds on slowly. A planning application has been submitted for 8 flats on Bessborough Road, but of course we're still a long way from an overall scheme for the Alton Estate. We have just seen a further consultation on changes at Aubyn and Toland Squares on Roehampton Lane. Next door to this the Society of the Sacred Heart are proposing 8 supported living flats.

Dial House on the Upper Richmond Road just west of **The Fox and Hounds** is a plain red brick office block which in the more car orientated 1970's was set back to allow for road widening that never happened. If you don't know it, you will know the six splendid plane trees that stand in front of it. This month's big application is to reclad and reconfigure the building, but still as offices. We can see why they want more

glazing and a new entrance with a URR address, but have urged the Council to ensure those trees are protected and to ask for the forecourt to be further planted.

At Wandsworth's recent **Conservation and Heritage Panel**, senior planners present agreed with me that there needs to be a standard condition that where front gardens are paved, and that paving must be permeable. Next, we'll try to get them to retain perimeter planting. But there still doesn't seem to be an answer about where to put 5G 'phone masts. We're told that the council are "talking to the major providers".

In a new departure we have seen a couple of roof extensions refused because of visible impact when seen from behind. Of course, this can only happen in conservation areas.

Other good news is that the roof of the lovely Georgian garden temple at Mount Clare has been completed, preventing further deterioration and saving the painted ceiling. But sadly, it will continue to be fenced off until the University find more money for the doors and windows.

Update from the Wandsworth Museum Action Group (WMAG)

Cllr. Rex Osborn was appointed History Champion for Heritage, Arts and Culture in July. One of his roles is to liaise between WMAG and the Council and to communicate their ideas and ambitions to the Council. Currently these are: - to be given display space in The Borough Libraries where they can present curated items from the collection, hold an annual exhibition in Battersea Arts Centre collaborating with The Director of Roehampton University's Heritage course, and, more ambitiously still, develop a Cluster Concept incorporating Museum/ Environmental Centre/Art Gallery/ Performance Space, perhaps with some commercial venture as a financial back up. But **WMAG** know they need to raise awareness. There are 327,000 people in this Borough, few of whom know that there is a museum without a home.
